Finance and Administration Committee - 11/16/21

Present: Chairman CH Sullivan, Mayor Justin Hanson, Aldermen Jeff Morris, Johnetta Yarbrough, Chris Richardson, Danny Wallace, John Edwards. Recorder Treasurer Tina Dunn, Directors Molly Glass, David Gray, Lessie Fisher, Chief Richard Griggs.

Ronnie Neill from Municipal Technical Advisory Service spoke to the committee regarding annexation which can only happen through referendum or owner consent. Director Gray briefly discussed Covington's utilities capabilities in relation to the announcement of Blue Oval City at the Regional Megasite.

Members from Spectrum, the current owners of the Rayovac property, and representatives from TN Department of Environment and Conservation attended the meeting virtually. Options to build a park on the property were discussed at length with reports on what has been done to the property to make it and keep it safe. Several committee members reported that their constituents were not favorable to developing the property and it was decided that this discussion would be tabled until the next meeting.

Parks and Recreation Director Molly Glass and Public Works Director David Gray discussed repairs that need to be made at the Jaycee building. A quote for \$4,600 from Peter Simonton was submitted for only the damage that is visible on the outside of the building. Rotted poles at the baseballs fields were also discussed. Covington Electric agreed that six poles were in danger of falling and needed to be replaced immediately. The Committee voted to replace the poles at a cost not to exceed \$15,000.

There was discussion on the practice of waiving fees for 501-C3 organizations for events that come before the Special Events Committee. It was decided that individuals who come before the Special Events Committee pay 100% of the fees, non-profits pay 50% of the fees, and organizations that partner with the City can request to have the fees waived.

Director Fisher gave a report on the progress made on the Municipal Code discussion.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
