1. Vehicle Disposition

One of the three vehicles ordered under the 2019 – 2020 Budget has arrived and is in service. This is the Chiefs' F-150.

Information from the dealer is that the two Ford Explorers have yet to be built and may not be delivered before April or May.

After speaking with Brad Kinney, he and I believe that we would receive a longer service life out of trucks or full-size SUV's. We checked with the dealer and learned that he had several Ford F-150 PPV (Police Pursuit Vehicles) that would be available for delivery in late February. We cancelled the order for the Explorers and ordered two of the F-150 PPVs.

The F-150s cost is \$32,375.50 a \$1000.00 per vehicle savings over the Explorers.

2. Personnel

We have hired two non-certified officers who will attend the Memphis Police Academy beginning February 17, 2020. We have also hired one civilian Property and Evidence Specialist. This brings our personnel complement to 32 (30 Commissioned and 2 Non-Commissioned), with an authorized complement of 39. This leaves 7 open commission positions.

3. Training

Officer Dylan Daniel graduated from the Tennessee Law Enforcement Training Academy (TLETA) on December 20, 2019 and is now released from FTO (Field Training Officer) training and riding as a one-man car.

Cpl. Maclin and Officers Stanifer and J. Taylor attended an FTO Trainer school in Nashville in December and are now certified FTO Trainers. Cpl. Maclin will be attending an FTO Program Management School at the University of North Florida, Institute of Police Management in Jacksonville FL in March. This school will give her the skills and knowledge needed to properly manager our FTO Program.

Upcoming training:

In April, Captain Black will be attending a Law Enforcement Management and Administration School at TLETA. The Law Enforcement Management and Administration class provides police managers the tools to effectively manage the various legal mandates of the state and federal governments. This class is designed to provide chiefs and command officers with the knowledge and ability to deal with daily duties in an effective and proactive manner.

The Property and Evidence Specialist will be taking an online course from the International Association of Property and Evidence that will provide him with a foundation of key issues in managing a property room. This course will certify him as a property room manager.

Additionally, MTAS LE Consultants met with us on January 23, 2020, and worked with us on reviewing policy and procedures and improving our process as it relates to property and evidence. They also provided additional training.

4. Body Cameras

Our body cameras are becoming outdated and need to be replaced. Sgt. Ginn has met with our body camera cloud service provider Intrensic, who is now offering both cloud service and cameras. Intrensic provided us with a new quote to replace all body cameras and provided cloud storage.

The cost will be split into 4 yearly payments at a total cost of \$49,658.00.

Our present system is a yearly cost of \$18,000.00 a year, or \$72,000.00 over 4 years, a savings of \$22,342.00.

We have reached out to other providers and received one quote, which is attached. The other providers would not provide a quote without a demonstration.

I am requesting approval to move forward with updating the body cameras and cloud storage through Intrensic.

Guidelines for a Southwest Members Care, Inc. Grant

Information to help you complete your grant application

1. The Southwest Members Care program is intended to support projects that benefit communities in the Southwest Tennessee Electric Membership Corporation (Southwest TN EMC) service area. This program does not fund (a) to support any candidate for political office or any political office or any political purpose; (b) to finance any operation of Southwest Tennessee Electric Membership Corporation; (c) to support school programs that are normally (or in the opinion of the Southwest Members Care board should be) supported by school budgets.
The program, however, may fund projects specific to separate organizations from schools (PTOs or youth groups that are open to the public, for example), if the Southwest Members Care board deems that the benefit of the project will be felt community-wide.
2. Southwest Members Care grants submitted by individuals will not be funded. Special needs for an individual may be considered if the grant is submitted by a qualifying organization. For example, if an individual's house burned, a community organization (civic club, etc.) could apply for a grant to assist the individual.
3. To ensure the best opportunity at having a grant funded:
 - Complete the applications fully and clearly. Incomplete applications will not be considered.
 - List all other primary funding sources for the project. The Southwest Members Care grants are designed to assist projects as a source of supplemental funding.
 - Include a detailed description of intended use of the funds.
4. Grants are reviewed on a case-by-case basis. Applications may, at the discretion of the Southwest Members Care board, be either fully funded, partially funded, declined, or the organization may be asked to resubmit, providing additional information.
5. Southwest Members Care grants are reviewed by an independent board, made up of non-paid volunteers from Southwest TN EMC service areas. Neither members of the Southwest Tn EMC Board of Directors nor employees of Southwest TN EMC may serve on this board.

6. The Southwest Members Care Board of Directors meets regularly based on the number of applications received (no less than quarterly) to consider grant funding. Grant applications must be received at the Southwest TN EMC Corporate Office in Brownsville, TN not later than the last working day of the month prior to the next scheduled Southwest Members Care Board meeting, to be considered.

- all forms of Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma cancer;
- colon cancer;
- skin cancer; or
- multiple myeloma cancer.

The presumption is not automatic, and the Act states that a firefighter who desires to utilize the presumption must successfully pass a pre-employment physical medical examination, and the examination must include a cancer screening that fails to reveal any evidence of the cancers listed in the Act. The decision to have the cancer screening rests with you, the applicant. Please indicate your desire by checking only one of the two boxes below and signing the form.

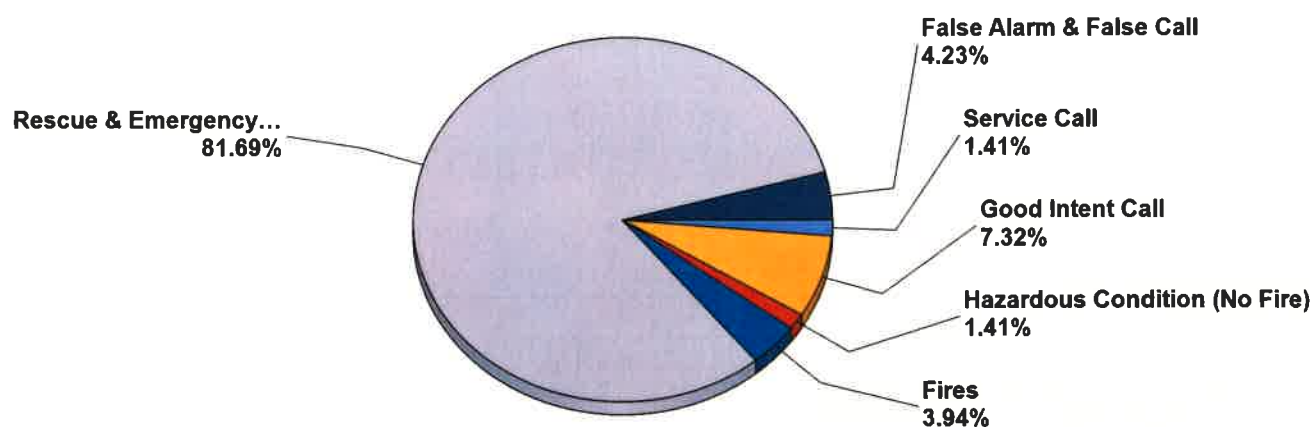

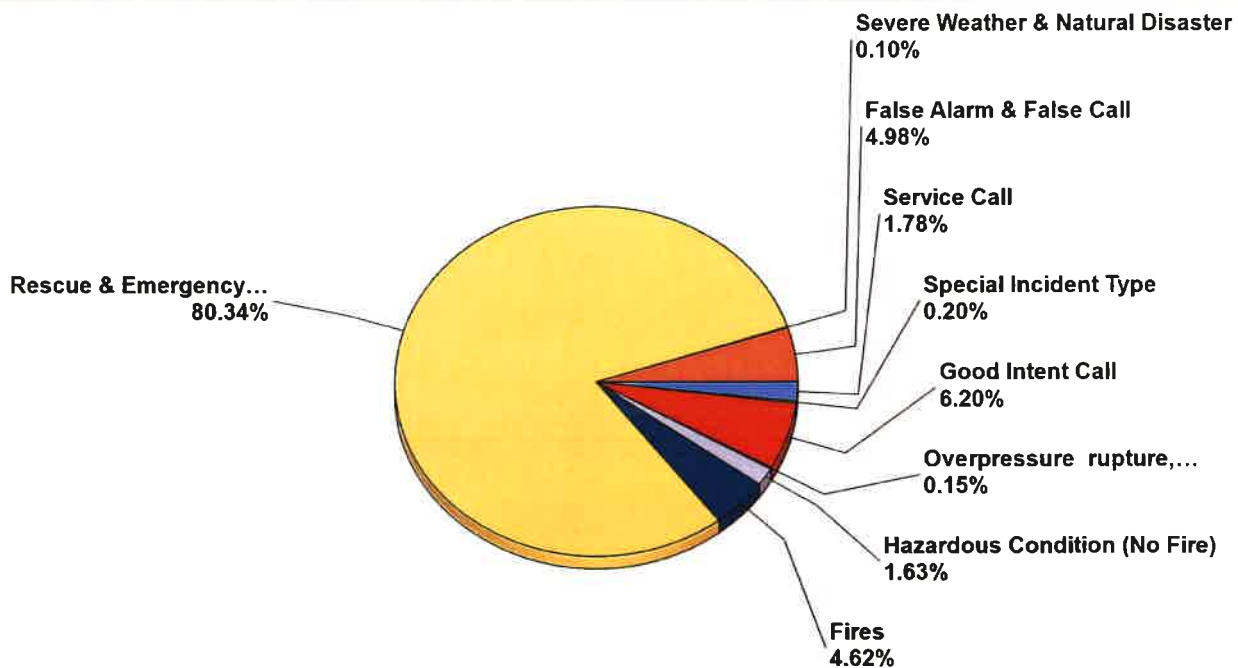

Smoke Alarms at Home

SMOKE ALARMS ARE A KEY PART of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.



SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- There are two kinds of alarms. Ionization smoke alarms are quicker to warn about flaming fires. Photoelectric alarms are quicker to warn about smoldering fires. It is best to use both types of alarms in the home.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

FACTS

- ❗ A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- ❗ Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level. Smoke alarms should be connected so when one sounds, they all sound. Most homes do not have this level of protection.
- ❗ Roughly 3 out of 5 fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.
