



On Saturday, June 25, Vietnam Veteran and Folk Artist Frank Lilly lectured at the Tipton County Museum. He showed how to incorporate “found” objects into artwork. He told the audience to “Stop seeing stuff *as* stuff; instead, *look at its shape*.” He also told everyone to “be interested in everything.” At the end of the lecture, Museum Director Barrie Foster presented him with art supplies as a thank you for his lecture, and a Vietnam Commemoration lapel pin for his service to our country. His artwork is on display and is for sale at the Tipton County Museum through August 1.

Salem Church presented FEED THE NEED Saturday at the Boys and Girls Club of the Hatchie River Region on Alston Street in Covington. Partners in the program included Frank Miller Pharmacy, Covington Fire Department, Covington Police Department, Tipton County Sheriff’s Department, Tipton County Health Department, Keys to Life CDC, Cannon Chiropractic, and Kappa Alpha Psi. Special presentations were made by Dr. Jesse Cannon and Mayor Justin Hanson.



Over 100 people were served food and many booths were open, including a focus on safety by the Tipton County Sheriff’s Department (L) and Kappa Alpha Psi, who educated visitors on how to protect babies from SIDS (R) at Feed the Need held at the Boys and Girls Club and sponsored by Salem Church.

The regular meeting of the Public Safety Committee took place Tuesday at 1:00 at Covington City Hall. Chairman Mac McGowan called the meeting to order and asked Covington Fire Chief Michael Naifeh to report.

Chief Naifeh reported that the firefighters have begun evaluations of Self Contained Breathing Apparatus items. These evaluations will take place for approximately 21 days and then the bidding process will begin. He anticipates a bid to be accepted in August. They have also located a refurbished SCBA fill station. He anticipates saving about \$1500 by using the refurbished model, which will have a warranty.

Chief Naifeh included in his handout a leave policy he has developed along with Personnel Director Tiny Barton and Recorder-Treasurer Tina Dunn. This policy addresses regular 40 hour a week employees, along with 24-hour schedules and shift personnel. Chief Naifeh stated he has researched these types of policies in other fire departments and has receive approval from Mrs. Barton in Personnel for the policy submitted today. Chairman McGowan stated he needs to understand it better before voting to approve and asked for time to study it. Alderman John Edwards motioned to take the plan under advisement in order to study it more. Alderman Ed Timberlake seconded. Motion passed

Naifeh reported he has reached out to MTAS for guidance to start a process for promotional testing for fire lieutenant and Driver. He plans to meet with Dennis Wolf next Tuesday to begin working through this process. Mayor Hanson asked him to re-examine the budget to make sure this was still listed. The budget has undergone much negotiations and change in the past several months. Naifeh stated he will go back and look at the budget that has been submitted for approval.

Chief Naifeh stated he will attend the TN State Fire Commission Meeting Thursday, June 30. He also plans to attend the Tennessee Fire Chiefs Annual Conference in Murfreesboro July 11-13.

Chairman McGowan asked for a motion to accept Naifeh's report with assurance budget contains funds for promotions. Edwards seconded the motion and it passed.

Covington Police Chief Buddy Lewis began his report by asking Covington Housing Authority Director Christi Billings to address the committee about a safety grant she has received. Mrs. Billings stated over 250 applications were submitted for this grant, and only 24 were awarded nationwide. Covington Housing Authority was one to receive the grant, which is for surveillance cameras. Mrs. Billings stated she will be cooperating with Covington Police Department to install and monitor the cameras on all CHA campuses and hopes they will be installed and fully operational by this fall.

Chief Lewis reported that Tennessee has passed a law that allows full time employees on State university and college campuses to carry concealed handguns as long as they have the appropriate permits and meet other requirements. One of those other requirements is to complete a form with local law enforcement so the police will know who might be armed. This will effect TCAT and DSCC in Covington. Lewis has a meeting with DSCC in Dyersburg about this issue. The law goes into effect July 1. Chief Lewis stated multiple law enforcement agencies in Tennessee opposed this legislation, including The Tennessee Sheriff's Association, The Tennessee Chiefs of Police, and The Tennessee Attorney General's office. Alderman Edwards motioned we draft a letter to the Tennessee Legislature encouraging them to listen to voices of authority and common

sense when making laws. Timberlake seconded. Chief Lewis stated he certainly understands people's rights to be armed, but this law puts law enforcement officers in difficult positions when responding to calls. When they see a person with a gun, it may or may not be the perpetrator of a crime. Chairman McGowan said he agreed with the law stating that many times gun free zones are often where gun crimes take place. Timberlake asked for clarification of the motion, and McGowan asked Tina Dunn to read the motion again, which she did. The vote was 3-1 for sending the letter with McGowan voting against it.

The Covington Police Department will begin recognizing especially good work by acknowledging an employee of the month starting in July. The command staff in the department will review data and statistics to determine the recipient of this acknowledgement each month.

The State of Tennessee required that each law enforcement department create a sexual oriented crimes policy. After researching and reviewing other such policies throughout Tennessee, Lewis has developed a policy for Covington and included a copy in his handout for committee members.

Drug Recognition Expert Training will take place in Nashville and two officers from the Covington Police Department have been selected to go. The training will take place for 9 days and all costs will be covered by The Governor's Highway Safety Office. Lewis is excited to have two officers from his staff trained in this way and believes it will prove very beneficial to Covington.

Chief Lewis recognized Chief Naifeh and the Covington Fire Department for winning the 2nd annual "Battle of the Badges" held recently at Covington High School as a fundraiser for the Boys and Girls Club of the Hatchie River Region. Lewis reported that he believes the event raised approximately \$25,000 for the club this year. He went on to state that Covington's officers are making contributions to the community in positive ways and not just putting people in jail. Both departments also participate in Carl Perkins Center's Dancing with the Stars. While on this topic, Lewis read an email from a Munford citizen praising one of the CPD officers for his interactions with their family at the Covington Burger King.

Chief Lewis reported that he is on the Board of Directors of the Tennessee Association of Police Chiefs and will begin his duties in this respect next month at their meeting in Chattanooga.

Alderman John Edwards motioned to accept the report submitted by Lewis and Timberlake seconded. The motion passed. July Public Safety Committee meeting will be July 14.

The regular Board of Mayor and Alderman meeting was held at Covington City Hall Tuesday, June 28. Present were Alderman Jere Hadley, Alderman John Edwards, Alderwoman Minnie Bommer, Alderman Mac McGowan, Alderman Ed Timberlake, and Mayor Justin Hanson. Alderman Drew Glass was absent.

Minutes from previously held committee meetings were reviewed and approved. There was a request for approval for the second annual Grace Race to support the Boys and Girls Club of the Hatchie River Region. This was unanimously approved subject to meeting safety standards. The race is scheduled to take place September 24, 2016.

Recorder/Treasurer Tina Dunn read a resolution from the State comptroller's office to adopt internal controls and accept the State internal controls manual. After some discussion, this resolution was affirmed by the council with a unanimous vote.

Mayor Hanson named Joseph Mack as the new Covington Parks and Recreation Director. After a long application and interview process, Mr. Mack was selected for the position. The Board affirmed his appointment with a unanimous vote.

Mayor Hanson reappointed Ralph Cousar to the Covington Industrial Development Board. The Board affirmed his appointment with a unanimous vote.

Mayor Hanson appointed J. Houston Gordon to the Tipton County Veteran's Museum Board. The Board affirmed his appointment with a unanimous vote.

Mayor Hanson reappointed Dr. Jim Baddour to the Covington Electric System Board. The Board affirmed his appointment with a unanimous vote.

Attorney Rachel Witherington was sworn in as City Attorney for the City of Covington. She was named and affirmed by the Board at the June 14 meeting. In her report, Attorney Witherington stated she has been in touch with PHG, who is operating the biomass facility. They have requested that the City of Covington provide


a full time employee on site when doing testing at the facility. She also stated she has begun title searches for the Price and Wynn properties on North Main Street.

Mayor Hanson presented the 2016-17 budget for final reading. Alderman Edwards and Alderwoman Bommer both expressed concern for more funding for the Boys and Girls Club of the Hatchie River Region and stated they could not vote for a budget without additional funding for this entity. Alderman Edwards then made a motion for an additional \$13,500 be added to this line item bringing the donation from the City to \$26,000.

Alderman Mac McGowan asked where these additional funds might come from. Edwards suggested taking them from The Chamber donations or somewhere else. When asked if his motion was to take the \$13,500 from the Chamber and reallocate that to The Boys and Girls Club, Edwards stated that was not necessarily his intent – just to find the money somewhere and increase the amount. Alderwoman Bommer stated if the Board can do that, then they could move forward with the budget. Alderman Edwards talked about the programs at the Girls and Boys Club this summer, the trips they have taken, and how this exposure is something the children may not have gotten otherwise. Edwards said he will certainly vote for a budget with this additional funding.

McGowan stated he would not vote for this increase without knowing where the money might come from. He stated he felt they would be shirking their duties if they didn't have a better plan for funding. Mayor Hanson stated there had been strong collaboration among department heads and Board members for three months to craft the budget that was in its third and final reading. Bommer responded that they have certainly welcomed changes but it sickened her that no more money was allocated for the Boys and Girls Club. McGowan said he is just asking for modification to show where this additional \$13,500 will come from because it's not fair to make a motion without knowing where the funds will come from. He went on to say he would be glad to look at this in October/November and consider options at that time, or we can take from our donation to the Chamber or from the fund balance. Alderman Edwards asked Recorder/Treasurer Tina Dunn if we took \$13,500 out of the fund balance would it bankrupt the city. She stated it would not. At that time, McGowan asked Dunn to read the motion made by Edwards again, which she did. Alderwoman Bonner seconded Edwards' motion. Mayor Hanson asked for a roll call vote and the motion passed with a unanimous vote. At that time, the budget was passed and accepted with a unanimous vote.



Injuries by Fireworks Type*



Injuries by Age





Veteran of the Month for July, 2016

Ridley Clifton

Ridley Clifton was born at home on a farm in Tipton County on February 13, 1948, the oldest of five children. He enlisted in the U.S. Navy in Memphis in October of 1967 following his graduation from Byars-Hall High School, serving time as a Machinist Mate until his Honorable Discharge in September of 1971. During his time in the Army, he was assigned to the USS Sproston (DD-577) in Pearl Harbor and the USS Harry E. Hubbard (DD 748) in the Western Pacific that included three trips to the Vietnam War Zone. Ridley was also assigned to Australia and New Zealand before returning to his final duty station in Long Beach, California.

In December 1969 while in Long Beach, Ridley met his wife, Kathy. She was part of a local group of YWCA Christian Girls who provided Christian fellowship to the military men. Ridley pursued her, and they were married in 1973.

After receiving his Honorable Discharge, he worked a variety of jobs in Long Beach, including X-ray technician attendant and darkroom technician at a local hospital and Federal firefighter at the Long Beach Naval Air Station. In 2005 he and Kathy moved to Tipton County where he worked as a bus driver for Tipton County Schools. Ridley is an Elder at Ebenezer Cumberland Presbyterian Church. He and Kathy have one son. Kathy nominated Ridley for Veteran of the Month.
