The regular meeting of the Finance and Administration Committee was held at Covington City Hall on Tuesday in the Lower Level Conference Room. Committee Chairman Alderman C.H. Sullivan called the meeting to order at 1:00 and called for discussion for the first item on the agenda, which was a continued discussion with City Judge Beth Ziarko about delinquent property taxes. Ziarko stated there was little she could add from last discussion except that she is making progress and there is a delinquent tax sale scheduled in February, 2017. She asked Codes Officer Lessie Fisher to get her a listing of delinquent property taxes that are 18 months old and older, and she will make an amended complaint to those property owners. She explained that this will get their names tagged in the computer for collection. Alderman Glass asked Ziarko to give him a simple explanation about collecting delinquent taxes, as this is often a question he is asked. Ziarko stated that usually a petition is filed when tax delinquencies are about 18 months behind, then it takes another several months to get the auction together. Ziarko stated that we aren't in the business of creating hardships for people, so property owners can make payment and redeem themselves. She went on to state that she puts notice of these sales in The Leader and that it is a BIG ad so people can be adequately notified. She went on to say that she is getting ready to sell property in February that has been delinquent since 2015.

Alderman McGowan asked Ziarko if her process is the same as those of surrounding municipalities, and she stated that everyone must follow the same State Statute. She also stated that she and others who deal with delinquent property taxes from around the State of Tennessee meet annually for training. She went on to say that she follows the law and has two sales a year – February and September.

Alderman Sullivan moved to the second item on the agenda, which was a discussion of the two buildings the City owns adjacent to the Covington Municipal Center – the old Leader Building and the old bank building on South Main Street. Mayor stated he has had conversation with Kay Smith and Chad Smith of Property Place and asked Chad to address committee regarding the two buildings that were included with the purchase of the First Baptist Church property.

Smith stated both buildings need some work to get them up to Code standards, and he recommended lowering the price in order to sell them. Smith provided sales information on three comparable buildings that have sold on or near the square recently and the committee looked over those documents. Smith believes if asking prices are lowered, we might expect a sale. Glass stated that in his opinion, quicker we sell the buildings and can start a capital improvement account, the better. Alderman Edwards asked when the last time was those properties were appraised, and Mayor Hanson stated he didn't believe the buildings had been appraised since he has been in office. The asking price was based on tax appraisals. Alderman Edwards asked if we should get them appraised and Mayor Hanson stated if that was the will of this committee, he would certainly support it. Alderman Glass asked if those buildings were appraised when the Church property was purchased by The City, but the consensus of the committee members was that the Church purchase included all properties in a package deal without separating the costs of each.

Edwards stated he believes we need to know exactly what they are worth before marketing them again because we have a fiduciary responsibility to get as much as we can for these buildings. Sullivan stated the "comparables" supplied by Mr. Smith should give us a reasonable idea of what these properties can bring. Sullivan and Edwards both expressed the desire to tour the buildings before making a decision. Glass suggested going up and touring after the meeting. McGowan stated he is willing to go and tour, but if Edwards wants to make a motion to have the buildings appraised, he would second it. However, McGowan went on to state he really doesn't believe we must have an appraisal because of the information supplied by Smith who has experience in property sales. Edwards then made the motion to have an appraisal done, and McGowan seconded. Edwards stated an appraisal would give a "real" figure. McGowan stated an appraisal is methodical, but it is still their opinion. Sullivan stated he knows several appraisers who can do this, but he isn't sure how soon it can get done or how much it would cost the city. McGowan, Sullivan, and Edwards voted to have an appraisal done, and Glass and Hanson voted

no. Hanson made a motion to table the discussion until the January F & A committee meeting and allow members to tour the facility. That motion passed unanimously.

Sullivan moved to third item – 126 West Washington Street demolition – these two structures are the house and shed on the CMC Property directly across the street from City Hall. Lessie Fisher was asked to address this issue. Fisher stated that since the city acquired these structures, they have not been inhabited. Fisher has taken the demolition proposal to the Historic Zoning Committee and they approved it. Mayor Hanson stated this property is ideal for parking, particularly as the CMC comes to fruition and is utilized. Fisher stated she can ask for bids for the demolition. McGowan asked Fisher if it is her recommendation to take these buildings down. Fisher stated the garage structure is already falling in and since they are not inhabited, and there are no plans for using them, and the Historic Zoning Committee approved their demolition, then yes, she believes they should come down. McGowan then moved for the committee to approve demolishing the outbuilding and the house and requested that Fisher come back with bids from contractors. Glass seconded. Alderman Edwards stated he hasn't had a chance to look inside and he will not vote for the demolition at this time. Sullivan asked what kind of shape the house is in and Fisher stated there is already deterioration inside. Glass stated that he prefers this committee develop a long-term plan for the property before making decisions. McGowan asked if there might be interest in purchasing the house and having it moved. McGowan then modified his motion to 1. Have Fisher seek cost for demolition of the house, 2. Go ahead and demolish the out building (by CPW) and 3. Explore the selling of the house for moving it off the property. Glass seconded that motion. Edwards suggested making the house a welcome center. Hanson stated it is just sitting there, is not used, and in a great place for additional parking; however, this is good discussion and these are good ideas. McGowan's second motion passed unanimously.

Next item on agenda was public meeting times. Before getting to this, Mayor Hanson stated there has been a suggestion to cancel the Public Safety meeting scheduled for next week. Committee voted to cancel this meeting due to holidays, as many would be unavailable.

Sullivan turned this discussion over to Mayor Hanson. Hanson stated that 1:00 meeting time was set many years ago and he believes if committee meetings are moved to 4:00, more people may be able to attend. Several of the sitting aldermen are working full time and this might help them with scheduling. Alderman Edwards stated this will make some City employees mad because most people get off at 5:00. Hanson stated he will give City employees time to adjust their schedules, if necessary. Glass stated that feedback he gets from citizens is that later in the day is an easier time to get to meetings rather than 1:00, and he believes this will offer people a chance to attend and get involved. Edwards said Glass made a good point, but for him, personally, he doesn't get off until 5:00 – so he will still have to adjust his schedule. Mayor stated he made this suggestion for discussion and he will do whatever the committee decides.

Margaret Fleming spoke up and said she got this feedback from people when she was campaigning – many people told her they didn't like 1:00 meetings. Edwards stated he is able to take his lunch break at 1:00, but he understands 1:00 is a difficult time for some people. McGowan stated he would be in favor for trying the 4:00 time to see how it works, for perhaps 3 months. Hanson reiterated he doesn't want to complicate things, but simply wanted to lift this idea up for discussion. McGowan motioned to put this discussion off until the full committee could be here to discuss. Motion passed unanimously.

Building codes inspector Lessie Fisher asked the committee to allow her to update our codes to meet current state standards. The following codes will be updated to the 2012 State codes standards:

McGowan asked Fisher if she was asking to approve adopting 2012 State Codes? She replied that because the State last updated in 2012, those are the most current updates, and that is her request – to update to State’s most current updated standards.

McGowan then motioned for the committee to start approval process of approving the 2012 as listed (in Fisher’s handout) and Alderman Edwards seconded. Motion passed unanimously. Meeting adjourned.



The Covington Police Department is involved in an ongoing operation initiated December 5 due to criminal activity that increased over the past several months.

Covington Police Chief Buddy Lewis describes the details. "It is no secret that there has been an increase in criminal activity by certain individuals in our city and surrounding areas over the past several weeks. There have been shootings in other West Tennessee cities and counties that affect the City of Covington. The Covington Police Department is dedicated to apprehending any and all persons involved in criminal activity in our city. As Chief, I want to ensure our citizens we will take any and all measures to stop the gang activity and gang violence in the City of Covington. With that said, a special enforcement operation was initiated on December 5. Beginning that date, all officer's days off were cancelled. A team of officers began "Operation Peace and Goodwill". During the operation, our officers concentrated on the "high crime" areas and those individuals responsible for those crimes in our city. Those officers initiated traffic stops that netted arrests of individuals for outstanding warrants, burglary, illegal drugs, driving on suspended or revoked license, DUI, assault and other criminal charges. There were guns and drugs confiscated," Chief Lewis says. The total number of people arrested during the first week of this operation was 63. There were a total of 110 criminal charges placed on these 63 individuals.

"I am extremely proud of the efforts of the officers of the Covington Police Department," says Chief Lewis. "This special operation will continue. There has been a large amount of overtime worked and this will also continue. We are committed to make our city as safe as possible. The senseless shots fired calls we have been responding to will stop. We are determined to make certain that it does stop before someone is killed. There have been 36 calls of shots fired in our

city in the past approximately 3 months. There have been 8 incidents of injury or damage to houses and/or vehicles during that same period of time. Our efforts to combat this type of violence will not stop until we apprehend those responsible. Since the inception of this operation, there has been a significant decrease in this activity in the city of Covington,” Chief Lewis concluded.

Covington Fire Department Responds to Call

On December the 21st at about 12:13 P.M., the Covington Fire Department received a call of a structure fire at 9620 Hwy 59 South in unincorporated Tipton County with a person possibly trapped near Mason, TN. The first arriving unit, CFD Chief Naifeh, reported heavy smoke with fire showing in the Bravo/Charlie Division and about 25% involvement from the mobile home at 12:23 P.M.

Interior firefighting operations began and the fire was brought under control at approximately 12:58 P.M. Covington Fire Department was assisted on the scene by the Three Star Fire Department, the Braden Fire Department (Fayette County), the Tipton County Fire Coordinator and the Tipton County Sherriff’s Department.


Fifteen Fire Fighters (9 from Covington) and 6 pieces of apparatus (3 from Covington) were used to battle the blaze. No injuries were reported to civilians or fire fighters, however the home is a total loss. The cause is still under investigation.



Veteran of the Month for December 2016

Ernest Bowling

Ernest Bowling was born in southeastern Kentucky on October 30, 1931. After graduating from high school and with his only other options for employment being in the coal mining or timber industries, he joined the U.S. Army. In October 1950 he completed basic training in Ft. Knox and was shipped directly to Korea. He was there when the Chinese attacked and earned his Purple Heart on February 11, 1951 in a battle against North Korean and Chinese enemy forces at Sang-Sok, Korea. That September Ernest transferred to Ft. Benning, Georgia, where he was honorably discharged in 1953. He returned home to Kentucky where, in November 1955, he completed vocational school to become a machinist. With no jobs available, Ernest joined the U.S. Air Force in January of 1956. His duty stations included Freising, Germany; Hamilton AFB, San Francisco; and Pease AFB, Illinois. Following his honorable discharge in 1960, he worked for the Kentucky State Highway Department for several years. In September of 1967, he joined the U.S. Navy and served two tours of duty in Vietnam. His other Navy duty stations were Bermuda, Diego Garcia, Memphis, Hawaii, and Japan. After his retirement in 1984, Ernest enjoyed a 10-year civilian career as a private contractor working for the Navy. During his military career, Ernest earned the Combat Infantryman Badge, Korean Service Medal (four awards), Air Force Longevity Service Award, National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal (two awards), Fleet Marine Combat Operations Insignia, Vietnam Campaign Medal, and Navy Good Conduct Medal (four awards).

In 1994, Ernest and his wife, Amy Jean Couch Bowling, retired to their home in Munford. They have one son who lives in Tipton County and one daughter who lives in Florida. Sadly, Amy Jean passed away 15 months ago. Ernest attends the Chapel at NSA Mid-South in Millington and is a member of the Disabled American Veterans Chapter 116 in Munford. He was nominated for Veteran of the Month by his son Lonnie.


