May 23 - 27, 2016

Tuesday, May 17, The Finance and Administration Committee met at City Hall for their regular meeting.

Chairman Jere Hadley called meeting to order – gave schedule for upcoming meetings during budget hearings. First reading of budget is scheduled for **June 14 at 5:30**. Called meeting June 21 at 1:00 – second reading. **June 28 – regular meeting at 5:30 – this will be public hearing and third and final reading of 2017 budget**. Committee determined best time to start budget hearings will be Tuesday, May 24.

Request from Association from Preservation for African American History & Culture in Tipton County (APAAHCITC) presentation by Ms. Olean Anderson.....

- Handout (letter) was distributed about the APAAHCITC
- Group wants to acquire Price House at intersection of N. Main Street and Highway 51 for African American History Museum
- Dr. Price was first African American doctor in Tipton County.
- Want this museum to exist under umbrella of Tipton County Museum – not a separate entity.
- At stage where group needs to purchase property to make progress on restoration
- Ms. Anderson stated that Tipton County Executive Jeff Huffman has given verbal support to match city assistance in purchasing this building.
- Group asking city and county to share this cost – once property is purchased, group will apply for grants and assistance in renovating this property for the purpose of a museum.
- Ms. Anderson and APAAHCITC believes this will be a tourist attraction that will bring tourism dollars into Covington.
- Alderman Timberlake asked if building was appraised. Alderwoman Bommer stated is has been appraised. Alderman Glass asked the appraised value – Chairman Hadley didn't remember, but did remember that a presentation was made to museum board during previous administration.
- Alderman McGowan believed there was a title issue – Alderwoman Bommer said that has been cleared up. McGowan asked what kind of annual financial commitment would be required. Bommer believes something in the area of \$10,000 per year – matching funds for grants, etc. Bommer stated the group has already missed out on grant opportunities because they don't already own the property. House is on historical registry and cannot be torn down. Alderwoman Bommer and Ms Anderson stated the APAAHCITC will continue to raise funds and they also want representation on museum board.
- Alderman Glass – is this purchase time sensitive? Anderson stated house has been vacant for a while and building is in disrepair. It is zoned commercial and negotiations to reduce price have not been successful.
- Glass - great idea to have museum – seems this has a lot to do with the home as much as the museum itself – would you be open to other locations to house this museum? Other options? Anderson – no other locations are under consideration at this time. This house has Anderson also asked about renaming North Main Street Isaac Hayes Blvd. Hayes was born in this area. This house is a historic site
- Alderman Edwards – another reason to house museum there is it borders historic district – good location – house belonged to first African American doctor in Tipton County. Edwards feels this will bring people in to Covington and discussed the connection between Alex Haley museum in Henning and the Memphis attractions.
- Hadley stated he does understand the County has verbally committed to the purchase of this location, but it not aware of any commitment to annual funding at this time.
- Glass asked about fundraising to this date. Alderwoman Bommer stated funding has been used to ascertain the 501 C3 for the group. Staffing will come under museum. APAAHCITC will support, raise funds, and collect artifacts.

- Hanson reiterated intent to fall under umbrella of Tipton County Museum with a representative on this board from APAAHCITC. Bommer stated this is the plan.
- Bommer asked city to make a commitment to look at purchasing this property for the purpose for a museum to be under umbrella of Tipton County museum.
- Edwards motioned this committee authorize the mayor to research and investigate moving ahead with an \$80,000 commitment - Bommer seconded. The motion was discussed and was unanimously approved.

Attorney Rachel Witherington gave report on progress of YMCA taking management position over Sportsplex and pool

- Justin Inskeep of YMCA Millington did walk through of facilities May 6. Nothing major noted – some minor/cosmetic repairs suggested.
- Met with Dr. Charlotte Fisher and Glen Turner about usage of gym, which is attached to Sportsplex. YMCA doesn't really need gym during the day, so we don't anticipate much conflict there. Dr. Fisher seemed positive and excited about the YMCA taking over management at Sportsplex.
- Still working on negotiating with State about 2012 LPRF grant for pool cover, among other things. Attorney Witherington plans to meet with Mr. Parish of Tennessee Parks for conversation about this ASAP.
- City of Covington will have the option to terminate this partnership with the YMCA if they are unable to make progress and save us money. We will have the ability to analyze this financial situation on a monthly basis.
- Alderwoman Bommer asked about the exercise equipment that is required – Hanson stated we have met with the equipment company and are moving forward with the equipment. We will have new equipment regardless if YMCA takes over or not. This will be a multi-year lease agreement.
- Mayor Hanson wants to have a rough draft to this committee by next Tuesday when budget talks begin.
- Alderman Edwards asked about job description for park & rec director. Hanson stated this would change.
- Alderwoman Bommer asked about lease on head start program – Witherington stated there is a lease in progress and they are working on getting that ready for signatures.
- Report was unanimously approved

Request for Public Works Vehicles – David Gray

- Several CPW trucks are in disrepair – two currently out of commission and need costly repairs. Director David Gray asked committee to consider leasing vehicles as opposed to repairs. One truck currently out of commission is used daily in curbside pickup.
- Discussion about new and used trucks and costs needed. Alderman McGowan asked what is need? Gray said it is worn out. We will be hurting and without this truck, we won't be able to do our jobs accurately. Alternative is to pull a train behind a pickup.
- Recorder-Treasurer Dunn stated the money for one truck is already in next year's budget – but two have problems and need to be replaced.
- McGowan motioned that we replace this truck out of state bid list – referred to Tiny Barton in purchasing/personnel to determine what protocol is. Approve up to \$49,000 for truck and bed. Alderman Glass seconded motion to replace this truck. Motion passed.
- Gray continued with second truck – Manager Tim Fayne's truck – 2006 model with 140,000 miles. City purchased this truck used. Transmission went out – will cost about \$1800 to replace transmission. Can replace truck with \$22,270 or there is a lease option. Lease will be spread out over 4 years at \$5760 per year with option to purchase for \$1 at end of lease – or lease another one. Gray said this is 4th vehicle taken off the road in 15-16 budget.
- Gray stated the prices submitted today are from King Cotton – lower than what is on State schedule.

- Alderman McGowan motioned we do 48 month lease for the F150 truck under State Schedule for solid waste dept. Will have to amend budget. Timberlake seconded.
- Alderman Edwards asked if we will have to bid out for the lease. Barton stated we will have to bid out if it's not on State schedule. Will investigate this with King Cotton.
- Alderman Glass asked if this will be our first lease on the books? Yes. Glass asked we look at leasing across all departments – feels well thought-out leasing plan might be big savings for city over the years and will prevent piece-mealing vehicles here and there along the way.
- Chairman Jere Hadley agrees – so many vehicles...need regular rotation of vehicles.
- Mayor Hanson has encouraged department heads to look at leasing vehicles. Department heads have been researching this and will present next week. Seems leasing is good choice – keeps vehicles rotated and saves on unexpected repairs.
- Chief Lewis stated CPD has many vehicles over 150,000 miles and feels leasing needs to be researched for this purpose.
- Glass states he has seen other municipal budgets that are open to public that outline vehicle rotation processes – feels this is good step for Covington. Hadley feels a capital outlay plan is good idea and something that will save on budgeting. Glass wants to look at this (leasing and rotation schedule) across the board. Edwards wants us to be active in lease agreement and have copies available.
- Voted on lease of truck – motion passed. Glass voted no because he wants more of a long-term, comprehensive plan.

Request by Ayana Dowell for use of Frazier Park for May 29 – motion to approve by Edwards and seconded by McGowan. Use will be in memory of her brother. Hadley asked this will be in agreement in contingent on her following use policies

- Griffin stated Dowell has asked to borrow stage – there is a cost for that. She has requested porta-potties – we don't have those – but we do have restroom facilities available. Griffin wants Ms Dowell to sit with her and work out the details.
- Edwards amended his motion to be minus use of stage and porta-potties. Griffin stated she will be happy to work with her. It's a holiday weekend and staff will be needed.
- McGowan also stated approval with police and code approved
- Motion passed.

Hanson reminded department heads to bring budgets and requests with them to budget hearings next Tuesday following public safety meeting.

Mayor Justin Hanson, along with members of the Covington-Tipton County Chamber of Commerce and friends and employees of Brad Carlisle State Farm Insurance celebrated their grand opening and ribbon cutting Tuesday. The new facility is located at the corner of West Pleasant and Munford streets in the heart of Covington.



Covington Public Works crews have completed removal of debris and the planting of Crepe Myrtles for Phase I of the Crepe Myrtle Project. Look for the red blooms for years to come as these small southern trees grow into a beautiful corridor from Highway 51 up West Pleasant Street to our town square. Each was provided by private donations and the markers will soon be set listing those names.

The regular meeting of the Public Safety Committee was held Tuesday at City Hall. CFD Chief Michael Naifeh reported that he has held an interview with Lt. Richard Griggs for the position of Administrative Assistant to the Chief. Lt. Griggs was the only qualified candidate who applied for the job. With committee and Board approval, he will be sworn in at the Board of Mayor and Alderman meeting.

Naifeh also was pleased to announce that CFD received notification they had been selected for another Assistant to Firefighters Grant (AFG). The grant will be used to replace required air packs. Chief Naifeh stated that call volume continues to rise and distributed a call log printout supporting his statement. Also distributed was a listing of items handled by CARE officer Mark Heaston. Chief Naifeh's report was unanimously accepted by the committee.

Chief Buddy Lewis of the Covington Police Department distributed material from the Police Memorial and Candlelight Vigil held recently in Washington, DC. He played a recording from the event in which fallen officer John W. Delashmit's name was called out. Lewis stated what a tremendous honor it was for him to accompany Delashmit's family and represent Covington at such an honorable event.

Chief Lewis reported he is in the process of hiring for a vacant position. Several certified officers have applied and those not certified (who applied) have taken appropriate tests. Data collection is still a work in progress, but he hopes to fill the position ASAP.

Preparation for the 2016 Barbeque Festival continues. Covington Police Department will have a large presence at the event, including a booth where they will have displays supporting use of seatbelts and discouraging impaired driving. Barbeque festivities begin Thursday, June 2nd in Cobb-Parr Park in Covington and will continue through Saturday night.

Alderman Edwards asked Chief Lewis if CPD is still using surveillance cameras, and he stated they are. Data collected from these has been helpful and he anticipates requesting more in the near future.



Covington Fire Chief Michael Naifeh and Mayor Justin Hanson welcomed Lieutenant Richard Griggs to his new position as Administrative Assistant to the Fire Chief in a swearing-in ceremony at the regular meeting of Board of Mayor and Alderman last Tuesday.

Interviews began May 25 and continued through May 26 for a director of the Covington Parks and Recreation Department. An independent panel of parks and recreation experts from outside Tipton County was convened for the purpose of a thorough and impartial interview process. They will provide their recommendations to the Board of Mayor and Alderman for final consideration. Karen Griffin is presently serving as interim director.

An auction was held at the Covington Municipal Center (formerly First Baptist Church) Wednesday to sell the pews. All were purchased and cleared out so work can continue on this facility. The Tipton County Commission on Aging is scheduled to move their operations into the facility along with some city offices. After renovations are completed, this historic building will be used for headquarters for the Commission on Aging, city offices, special events, training, and available for rent for multi-purpose uses.

Veteran of the Month for May, 2016

William Travis Hawkins

William Hawkins was born on July 13, 1921 in Thaxton, Mississippi. When he was about a year old, his family moved to Union County, Mississippi, where he grew up on a farm. After his junior year of high school he enlisted in the U.S. Army. In October 1942, he attended basic training in Camp Hood Texas, now known as Fort Hood. He spent the first four months of World War II as a medic. After making Sergeant, he became Gunnery Commander of the first section the 3rd platoon and was sent overseas. His unit was the 612th Tank Destroyer Battalion Company B, and he was part of the front line that went ashore in Normandy on June 12, 1944. Along with several other soldiers, he was taken prisoner of war on December 17, 1944 in Belgium near the German border. In April 1945 they were marched every day as the Germans tried to keep the prisoners ahead of the allied forces. On April 29, 1945, the prisoners were liberated by General Patton's men.

Bill and his fellow P.O.W.'s found their way to an abandoned home in Germany, where they stayed 3 weeks. They lived on food rations given by the local authorities, as well as food that had been buried in the back yard. They made their way to Leeds, Belgium, where they met up with the American Red Cross. He continued on to France where he caught a boat back to the United States. The rest of his time was spent as an M.P. at Fort Belvoir, Virginia.

He moved to Kentucky shortly after his discharge, and enjoyed a varied civilian career. He was a cattle herdsman for 2 years, a pecan factory worker for 1 year, and district manager for Kemper Insurance Group for 15 years. He ended up buying a grocery store in DeSoto County, Mississippi, above which he lived for many years.

Bill lost his wife in January of 2011. He raised four wonderful daughters, one of whom lives nearby in Brighton. He attends the Assembly of God Church, and is a member of the West Tennessee Association of Ex -P.O.W.'s. He was nominated for Veteran of the Month by his good friend Andy Dunavant.

Frank Lilly Exhibits Artwork and Will Lecture at the Tipton County Museum in Covington!

Frank Lilly's artwork is now on display at the Tipton County Museum in Covington through June 25, 2016. Frank is a native of Clarksdale, MS, and studied at the Memphis College of Art in the 1960's. It wasn't until Frank was in his mid -50's that his work was publicly exhibited. Though he painted continuously throughout his adult life, most of his time was spent making a living for himself and his family. But even at his jobs, most notably the years he spent as operations foreman at Memphis' Mid-South Coliseum, Frank would find scraps of signs, posters and other materials and add them to his paintings. After years of creating art work that he would either give away or keep for himself, his friends and family encouraged him to approach the Universal Art Gallery in Memphis where his work was then displayed to the general public for the first time in his life. Today he continues painting and creating mixed media pieces for a wider audience. He is particularly proud of a one man show entitled "Look How Far God Has Brought Us" at Mt. Sinai Baptist church in February 2008 as part of Black History Month. As a true folk artist, his work clearly illustrates many events from his life and times from the cotton fields to the march Martin Luther King led in support of the Memphis garbage workers' union with their prominent "I am a Man" banners. His work can also be whimsical with titles like "Get Me Some Religion, Join the Baptist Church, Become a Preacher So I Don't Have to Work." His paintings and mixed media pieces may be impressionistic but never abstract. As Frank puts it, "My paintings tell stories that make statements people can connect with." Frank's artwork is featured at the Center for Southern Folklore in Memphis. Frank is a Vietnam Veteran. Frank will be presenting "Everyday Art for Everyday Folk: how to incorporate discarded or reclaimed objects into artwork" on Saturday, June 25 from 10 until 11:30 a.m. at the Tipton County Museum in Covington. Help Control Mosquitoes that Spread Dengue, Chikungunya, and Zika Viruses

Aside from being itchy and annoying, the bite of an infected female mosquito (*Aedes aegypti* or *Aedes albopictus*) can spread dengue, chikungunya, or Zika viruses. People become infected with dengue, chikungunya, or Zika after being bitten by an infected mosquito.

Female mosquitoes lay several hundred eggs on the walls of water-filled containers. Eggs stick to containers like glue and remain attached until they are scrubbed off. When water covers the eggs, they hatch and become adults in about a week.

Adult mosquitoes live inside and outside.

They prefer to bite during the day.

A few infected mosquitoes can produce large outbreaks in a community and put your family at risk.

Protect Yourself, Your Family, and Community from Mosquitoes

1. Eliminate standing water in and around your home:

- **Once a week**, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out items that hold water, such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpots, or trash containers. Check inside and outside your home.
- Tightly cover water storage containers (buckets, cisterns, rain barrels) so that mosquitoes cannot get inside to lay eggs.
- For containers without lids, use wire mesh with holes smaller than an adult mosquito.

2. If you have a septic tank, follow these steps:

- Repair cracks or gaps.
- Cover open vent or plumbing pipes. Use wire mesh with holes smaller than an adult mosquito.

3. Keep mosquitoes out of your home:

- Use screens on windows and doors.
- Repair holes in screens.
- Use air conditioning when available.
- Put plants in soil, not in water.
- Drain water from pools when not in use.
- Recycle used tires or keep them protected from rain.
- Drain & dump any standing water.
- Weekly, scrub vases & containers to remove mosquito eggs.

4. Prevent mosquito bites:

- Use an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellent with one of the following active ingredients. All EPA-registered insect repellents are evaluated to make sure they are safe and effective. Always follow the product label instructions.
- Reapply insect repellent every few hours, depending on which product and strength you choose.
- Do not spray repellent on the skin under clothing.
- If you are also using sunscreen, apply sunscreen first and insect repellent second.
- Treat clothing and gear (such as boots, pants, socks, and tents) with permethrin or purchase permethrin-treated clothing and gear. Treated clothing remains protective after multiple washings. See product information to find out how long the protection will last.

If treating items yourself, follow the product instructions carefully.

Do **not** use permethrin products, intended to treat clothing, directly on skin.

- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants.
